## OUR COMMITMENT TO THE WADAWURRUNG PEOPLE

'BE BRAVE. MAKE CHANGE.' THAT WAS THE CHALLENGE SET TO ALL AUSTRALIANS DURING 2022 NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK.

The Give Where You Live Foundation is committed to working towards reconciliation between the Wadawurrung People who are the Traditional Owners of the land in the Geelong region.

Wadawurrung Traditional Owner and Manager Cultural Education Corinna Eccles said, "It is time for Wadawurrung People to be rightfully acknowledged."

This is an important decision, for the Foundation and strongly aligns with Give Where You Live Foundation's purpose of building a fairer G21 Community.

"The Give Where You Live Foundation values being bold, imagining a better way and then pursuing that with courage and care."

"While this commitment in no way truly represents the value we all gain from the care and custodianship of the land the Wadawurrung have undertaken for millennia, it will be an enduring commitment towards achieving reconciliation and creating a fairer G21 community," Bill said.

During Reconciliation Week, the Give Where You Live Foundation encouraged the wider community to consider how they can also be Be Brave and Make Change throughout the year.

"There is a real opportunity for all organisations to play a role in contributing to a more reconciled nation. Philanthropy generates hundreds of billions of dollars of revenue each year, and public companies distribute the same in dividends. All of this wealth is built on foundations of our First Nations Peoples. Imagine the change that would occur if philanthropy and business, made payments to our First Nations People simply as a matter of course. Allowing them the right to focus on their ambitions and aims and determine where that funding is spent." Bill said.

The Give Where You Live Foundation wants to take a leadership role and inspire other philanthropic organisations and businesses across the country, to be brave and make meaningful change.

## **ARREEDA'S STORY**

**ARREEDA NOR WAB**, who lived in a refugee camp in Thailand for more than 25 years, has recently joined CatholicCare in the new position, funded by the Give Where You Live Foundation.

Arreeda says after arriving in Australia and finding employment as a Bilingual Support Worker she wanted to help support others in similar situations to herself, who don't know where to begin.

"When I first came to Australia, I felt like I couldn't do anything. But when I started as a bilingual worker, I felt that I could get a connection and I could help my people and I love that."

"My role at CatholicCare is really helping empower refugee women to find work and also support young people and families."

Arreeda said having a refugee background has helped her connect and support the community.

"When I first started as an interpreter there was not much engagement in my community. But because I speak both Karen and Karenni and I already have connection with the community, the community always came to me and asked when they needed help."

### **ARREEDA'S IMPACT**

Sarah Cunningham who works alongside Arreeda at CatholicCare, says this new role is bringing many benefits to the local refugee community.

"Funding from Give Where You Live has enabled us to employ Arreeda to support families directly. Her multilingual skills means that she can get information and deliver workshops and programs to our clients in their language, so they understand our systems," Sarah said.

"I couldn't do my job without Arreeda. She has made everything so much more efficient because she has the language skills that I don't have. We really complement each other, as I understand the systems and the structures, and she understands the community. So, we're a really great team," Sarah added.

Over the past six months, the focus for CatholicCare has been keeping young people engaged in education.

"Arreeda has really been able to communicate to the families how important it is for young people to stay in education. She's also been able to reengage some young people back into education and support families to understand why that's so important," Sarah said.





# YOUR DONATIONS AT WORK

IN MAY 2022, THE GIVE WHERE YOU LIVE FOUNDATION ANNOUNCED THE DISTRIBUTION OF **OVER \$525,000** IN GRANTS TO SUPPORT PEOPLE IN OUR LOCAL COMMUNITY THROUGH THE 2022 SURVIVE & THRIVE ANNUAL GRANTS PROGRAM.



## 2022 Survive and Thrive grants



**22 organisations from the G21 region, received grants of up to \$40,000 to support people in our community experiencing life-inhibiting crisis.**



### HOPE BEREAVEMENT CARE **\$40,000**

Hope Bereavement Care's Hope Baby and Child Loss program provides information, connection, groupwork and counselling to reduce isolation and build resilience for those grieving the death of a baby or child.

### LIFELINE GEELONG & SOUTH WEST VICTORIA **\$30,000**

Currently 10-15% of calls to Lifeline Geelong are unable to be answered. This grant will enable Lifeline Geelong to train 30 new community members to become volunteer Crisis Supporters. These volunteers will help to meet the increased demand and are expected to answer 8,250 calls to Lifeline Geelong annually.

### OCEAN MIND **\$30,000**

Ocean Mind programs change the lives of young people by delivering evidence-based therapeutic surfing interventions that build confidence, connection with the community and develop new skills. This grant will support Ocean Mind to meet the increased demand for their services and improve access to mental health services. It will support the delivery of up to 15 six-week programs and weekly surf club sessions for young people in our community.

### ONECARE GEELONG **\$40,000**

This grant will allow OneCare Geelong to run its COACH Community Mentoring Program, which empowers individuals and families who are experiencing family crisis and social isolation through one-to-one mentoring.

### RIDING FOR THE DISABLED - BARWON **\$10,000**

This grant will cover the cost of legal registration for the riders to ensure that payment is not a barrier for participation in the program.

### SAMARITAN HOUSE GEELONG **\$22,900**

Samaritan House Geelong was granted funding to support their Accommodation Living Skills Program (ALSP), a 12-week program to provide men experiencing homelessness with the knowledge and skills to help them to secure long-term, stable accommodation.

### SOLVE - TAD LIMITED **\$10,000**

Solve-TAD's project will reduce social isolation and increase the capacity of people with disability in the Geelong region by providing custom-built equipment that meets their individual needs. It will also enable them to participate more fully at home, school, work and in their community.

### SOMEBODY'S DAUGHTER THEATRE COMPANY **\$20,000**

This grant will fund the creation of a short film addressing the issue of consent, based on the song 'No Means No' from the new Nobody's Fool Theatre play 'When the Light Went Walking'.

### THE POWER IN YOU PROJECT **\$30,000**

This grant will be used to cover the cost of client services and programs. These include personal training, gym sessions, yoga, self-defence classes, cooking, art therapy & Community Connection Days. These programs aim to support the mental health of clients and engage them in positive activities interrupting drug and alcohol use while helping clients positively reconnect with the community.

### UNITING VICTORIA AND TASMANIA **\$40,000**

This grant will enable Uniting to continue employing a Housing and Homelessness Worker to help reduce accommodation insecurity across our region. It will provide people who are experiencing homelessness with access to advice, information and practical help to assist in their transition into housing

### ANAM CARA HOUSE COLAC **\$23,879.36**

This grant will allow Anam Cara House Colac to fund the recruitment, training, and support of volunteers to increase the amount of in-home volunteer support that is available to the community.

### BARWON DISABILITY RESOURCE COUNCIL **\$33,655**

This grant will allow Barwon Disability Resource Council to continue their individual advocacy work and provide crisis support. It will also support people with disability to strengthen their community connections, reduce social isolation and build self-advocacy skills.

### CULTURA **\$40,000**

This grant will fund the Geelong Community Connections (GCC) program which will create culturally sensitive orientation information for new arrivals who come to Geelong as part of the Humanitarian Settlement Program. These resources will be designed with recently arrived individuals and families and be coordinated by a local community member with a refugee background.

### ENCOMPASS COMMUNITY SERVICES **\$6,000**

This grant will support the Encompass Homestart Material Aid program to provide families and individuals experiencing immediate crisis with basic household goods.

### GEELONG ARTS CENTRE **\$25,400**

This grant will fund the 'This is me' project which uses creative mediums including animation, theatre, visual arts, and music as a tool to engage First Nations young people. It will empower them to share their stories of identity, develop confidence and skills, and to engage in their local community.

- 3216 CONNECT

\$2,400

This grant will enable 3216 Connect to provide nutritious meals to community members in the 3216 postcode.
- BELLARINE LIVING AND LEARNING CENTRE INC

\$30,000

This grant will enable Bellarine Living and Learning Centre to fund their food security project where participants can access food, pantry and personal items at a weekly foodbank market day. It also supports people to develop their skills to grow food at local community gardens and access a community meal program.
- DRYSDALE FAMILY SUPPORT

\$30,000

This grant will enable the Drysdale Family Support Foodbank to continue providing nutritious and fresh food to people facing food insecurity.
- GEELONG FOOD RELIEF CENTRE

\$20,000

This grant will contribute to the Geelong Food Relief Centre (GFRC)'s rising operational costs associated with the provision of Emergency Food Relief throughout the G21 region.
- LAZARUS COMMUNITY CENTRE

\$5,000

This grant will provide Lazarus Community Centre with funds to purchase food and other consumables to support community members with a daily volunteer-cooked hot lunch.
- THE WELCOME PLACE

\$5,000

This grant will provide people seeking asylum, or who have only temporary protection in Australia, and are also experiencing financial difficulty, to access culturally appropriate food on a regular basis.
- FEED ME BELLARINE

\$20,000

This grant will allow Feed Me Bellarine to increase their cooking capacity and enable them to purchase additional produce to meet an increasing community demand.
- THE OUTPOST

\$15,000

This grant will assist The Outpost to continue providing hot meals and drinks to those who are homeless or doing it tough.

GIVING COMMUNITY A CHOICE

AN INITIATIVE OF THE GIVE WHERE YOU LIVE FOUNDATION, THE COMMUNITY CHOICE PROGRAM BRINGS TOGETHER FOOD RELIEF AND LOCAL HOSPITALITY VENUES TO ADDRESS FOOD INSECURITY AND BRING THE DIGNITY OF CHOICE TO PEOPLE ACROSS OUR REGION.

SINCE 2020, there has been a 24% increase in demand from local support agencies for voucher assistance. In the Foundation's July 2022 voucher allocation, we received requests over \$150,000, however we were only able to provide funding for just under \$100,000.

THE IMPACT IN OUR COMMUNITY

FROM JANUARY TO JUNE 2022, WE PROVIDED

- \$60,627 in Community Choice food & pharmacy vouchers
- 3,163 vouchers distributed

WE WORKED IN PARTNERSHIP WITH

- 25 local community agencies to distribute vouchers and
- 10 local businesses exchanging voucher for food and pharmacy items

WHO COMMUNITY CHOICE HAS SUPPORTED

- 24% were single parents
- 20% people with disability
- 10% culturally diverse
- 80% reported being a recipient of government benefits
- 33% unemployed
- 23% impacted by health issues
- 14% on a low income or had unstable working hour



STORIES FROM OUR COMMUNITY

A family in emergency accommodation were provided with multiple Community Choice vouchers. The family members were extremely stressed for money due to having a limited income. They were so appreciative of the vouchers and had a very positive experience buying food from the Geelong Food Relief Centre who were so friendly and kind. The family has now been successful for Transition Housing, and when they find long-term housing intend to give back to the community as they are so grateful for the help they received. - BCYF

A young mother who fled family violence moved into a new home and needed to utilise all her funds just to take possession of the property to cover rent and bond. Having left her previous home with next to nothing, Community Choice vouchers helped her to replenish basic food staples in her new home plus a few extras. Having access to the Community Choice food voucher enabled her kids to attend school with snacks like the other kids have. - Bethany

A father whose wife had recently passed away and who had lost his job due to the pandemic, was sleeping in his car with his teenage daughter. He had managed to find a new home but had nothing in the way of furniture or household goods to set it up. He arrived at Homestart quite distressed and after we explained how we could help him, he was just so relieved and thankful. We provided beds, fridge, washing machine, dining setting, linen packs and a kitchen pack to help them set up their house and make a fresh start. People who are in this situation find it very hard to think about what they need and we are always there to help them figure out the essential items needed. He has also now gone on to find employment. - Encompass Homestart

**KERRY FARRANCE, HEAD OF IMPACT**, said the Foundation has developed the new Partnership Impact Fund to support the community to test, try and learn to tackle challenges in the community.

“Through this funding we hope to be seen as a ‘critical friend’ that walks alongside our partners to understand an issue, provide support at critical points, brainstorm ideas and partner in taking risks and trying something new,” she said.

Under the new Partnership Impact Fund, the Foundation has provided multi-year funding to the Geelong Food Assistance Network (GFAN) and OneCare to support the appointment of a new Geelong Food Assistance Network Coordinator role.

This new role, which has been funded by the Foundation along with the Anthony Costa Foundation and the Geelong Community Foundation, was created to provide support to food relief agencies operating throughout the region. It assists in assessing the need of the food relief agencies in our region, supports them in finding solutions and develops resources and opportunities across the network.

## FUNDING IMPACT

Since the new role commenced in January, Annette said she has already been able to support various food relief organisations across the region to help them address the diverse needs of their clients.

Annette has created a newsletter to share resources including training opportunities and funding opportunities with the GFAN network, which has already proven to be an invaluable resource.

Recently Annette shared information about an opportunity to upgrade existing fridges to new energy efficient fridges at no cost through the Victorian Energy Upgrades (VEU) program.

The Neighbourhood Centre in Forrest who needed to upgrade their fridge, was granted a brand-new fridge through this initiative, freeing up their funds to allow them to directly support their community.

Annette has also used her role to ensure that agencies have access to COVID-19 rapid antigen tests, courtesy of Barwon Health, to distribute to clients as needed. The City of Greater Geelong has also provided Annette with re-usable drink bottles to give to people accessing food relief.

She is also facilitating monthly training sessions through GFAN to ensure the sector has the knowledge it needs to provide the best possible support.



## Increasing demand for food relief

**AS A RESULT** of the COVID-19 pandemic and the increased cost of living, there has been an increase in the number of people in our community experiencing food insecurity, including many who are accessing food relief for the first time in their lives. Annette Devereaux, who has been employed in the new GFAN Coordinator role, said food relief services in Geelong are reporting an increase in requests for help across the region.

“Demand for food relief has increased and remains high. During COVID there was a lot of panic and people getting really concerned about how they would provide food for their family, particularly in isolation. And that’s continued to remain high, really high,” said Annette. Along with increased demand, Annette said the other issues impacting the sector included volunteer recruitment, retention and training alongside more people needing to access food relief for the first time in their lives.

“During COVID a lot of the food relief agencies continued to operate, but in a limited capacity so volunteers fell away during that time. To get them back now that the services are open for face-to-face support again, has been really difficult for many agencies,” said Annette.

Volunteer training is another focus area for Annette in her new role. “When I’ve gone to the agencies, I’ve asked them about what their needs are and one is certainly volunteer retention and recruitment, but the other one is volunteer training. Through COVID they’ve realised their clients are coming with more complex needs and sometimes presenting in really stressful situations... so knowing how to manage those clients has been really important.” As often people seeking food assistance are also experiencing a range of other issues, including homelessness and poor mental and physical health, Annette said she is also educating the network about other community services within the region. “Agencies have said that people are being referred to their service who are homeless, and so while, they can help with food they are unable to help clients with the other services they may need,” said Annette. Annette has organised a community services expo to help educate volunteers in the Geelong Food Assistance Network about the different supports available and how to refer to those services.

**A CHILD’S EARLY YEARS** form the foundation for their future and having access to high quality education helps give children the best start in life. The Foundation has funded EdConnect Australia to help increase education opportunities for young students at risk of disengaging from their learning.

EdConnect received a \$35,000 Education and Employment grant in 2021 to enable them to pair volunteer mentors with students who may need extra assistance and guidance. Thanks to the grant, EdConnect has this year placed two volunteers at Wangala Primary School in Belmont to support their new ‘Hands on Learning’ program.

This program offers a group of students the opportunity to engage with specialists and work on projects with the aim of growing their confidence and achieving greater success at school.

It helps foster strong relationships that assist young people develop the skills and abilities they need to succeed in work and life including collaboration, problem solving, communication and resilience.

Steven King, Wangala Primary School Principal and EdConnect School Coordinator said there is lot of excitement about the new Hands on Learning program.

“The school has a kitchen that is utilised for Breakfast Club and the Hands on Learning Café. Senior students engage in a cooking program that develops culinary skills and techniques to provide a café experience that all students benefit from. There is a group of junior master-chefs planning, preparing and catering for an opt-in lunch each Tuesday for all our community,” Mr King said.

The Hands on Learning Construction program has undertaken a number of refurbishment and improvement tasks at Wangala Primary School.

“They have cleared out an unused site to be the “Hands on Learning Hut” where they can construct and develop their skills. Already BBQ tables have been refurbished, a chicken coop built (nesting boxes planned) plans for murals on plain walls, new bird boxes and their own personalised toolboxes have been constructed,” he said.

Janine O’Connell and Rob Bailey volunteer through EdConnect Australia and assist in the new programs offered by the school.

“The EdConnect Australia volunteers we have been connected to the school have brought many different perspectives, life skills and provided varying opportunities for students to flourish both directly and indirectly through their volunteerism,” Mr King said.

EdConnect Volunteer Janine O’Connell said she is enjoying assisting with the program.

“I enjoy every moment of the Café! I have a background in Girl Guides so have many handy skills that can be utilised in this program. I have also started by leading a craft activity at lunchtime for the students. We started making bookmarks and are moving to knitting. I love assisting with the Breakfast Club at the school too,” she said.

Rob Bailey who assists in the Hands on Learning Construction program is also finding the experience of supporting the students rewarding.

“I am trained as a teacher, and have a mechanical background. I assist the construction crew on Tuesdays. The students have planted out vegetable gardens with hopes to link these to the café/kitchen crew as their crops become established,” he said.

As well as the Hands on Learning volunteers, Wangala Primary School benefits from other volunteer roles. The school also have EdConnect volunteers that assist in the Library and Gardens on a weekly basis, all made possible through the support of Give Where You Live.

**IN THE 2021 EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT** grant round, the Foundation provided Kids+ with a grant of \$35,000 to support their Alternative and Augmentative Connect (AAC) Program.

This program provides training to parents, carers, and educators to help support children and young people with complex communication conditions, including those who are non-verbal to remain engaged or re-engage with their education by expanding their speech pathology and communication technology services.

Research has shown that, without training, people don't always demonstrate skills necessary to support communication for individuals who rely on AAC and that short term intervention focused on parent implementation of strategies learned in a clinical setting, and then carried over at home, showed increased AAC use.

The ability to communicate effectively and be understood is a vital part of the human experience. This grant allows children and young people to continue their education and develop their skills and relationships in ways they previously couldn't.

AACConnect is a collaboration between Kids+ staff members, Senior Speech Pathologist, Jenna O'Brien, and AAC Technology Coordinator, Noah Callan.

Noah has lived experience using AAC strategies, with a particular interest in those involving technology.

"When I was younger, I lived in Japan. One of the benefits was how they embraced the Internet early, and I was



lucky enough to adapt to it... At about three, I can remember accessing our family laptop with AAC software to practice writing sentences," says Noah.

Since then, Noah has been passionate about using technology to assist him in the community.

"Even at such an early age, I could see the power technology could give me in my life. From there, AAC has been my whole life."

This technology has allowed Noah to not only communicate but has provided him with a wide variety of opportunities to help others. Noah delivers AAC related professional development training, including workshops and conferences for users, family members and carers, and allied health professionals.

This includes his work with the AACConnect Program, providing opportunities for people to advance their knowledge of AAC implementation to better support communication and foster more engaging and effective interactions between parents and their children.

One of these families is Lachlan's, who is supported by both Jenna and Noah to help incorporate AAC into everyday life.

Lachlan's AAC journey began when he was nearly three years old. He quickly showed an immense interest and his family has welcomed the technology.

"The most powerful and special moment was when Lachie told me he loves me, using his AAC device," said Lachlan's mum, Kylie.

"His device has been fabulous in him participating in medical appointments, whether it's describing what discomfort he is in, or how he is feeling going into the procedure. The device allows him to participate in conversations in a real meaningful way"

"This device has allowed Lachlan to have a voice! A voice to talk with friends, a voice to raise concerns, worries, and feelings, a voice to be cheeky with his family and friends, and a voice to share his opinions!" his mum added.

Not only does this device bring connection, but it opens many doors in Lachlan's future.

"It means he can have a very bright future and one with more independence than he would otherwise have without AAC."

- 1 Employment Readiness – supporting the skills and resources needed for people to be able to get a job.
- 2 Employment Pathways – supporting people into appropriate and meaningful employment pathways.
- 3 Supporting Job Retention – assisting with problem solving of barriers to ensure ongoing and sustainable employment.
- 4 Supported Employment – provision of appropriate, ongoing support for individuals that is necessary for success in a competitive work environment.

These key areas work to create fairer access to education and employment across our region.
